Wild Flowers

Chairman's Message

This past winter has been unusually mild; it has also been very wet which inevitably means the water level in the River Bollin has been up and down like a yo-yo. I am pleased to say however that the river renovation work undertaken bank by the Environment Agency almost a year ago has stood up to the onslaught very well with only a small amount of damage. It is hoped we can repair this damage later in the spring. This year we are going to experiment with turning one of our committee meetings into a members working party. That will be on Wednesday 25th April when the estate manager at the National Trust owned Quarry Bank Mill has offered to help us by making some of his team available. Details have still to be resolved but it looks likely that we will start sometime during the afternoon and work on into the evening until it gets too dark for us to see what we are doing! At the moment the intention is to carry out some work on the river banks by way of willow planting and weaving and also to make an early start on removing the Himalayan Balsam. I know a daytime start midweek will not suit some of you but there is still the evening. It you can join us on 25th April you will be very welcome and we shall be pleased to see you. The more that attend the more we can achieve. Further details will be circulated nearer the time.

You will also notice from the details elsewhere in this newsletter that we will again be having two Balsam Bash days this year with the first on 20th May - meet in the parish hall car park at 2pm. Experience has taught us that the earlier we can tackle the Balsam each year the better we can control the weed and bring it under control. After a very successful Balsam Bashing time this last summer when we progressed into areas of The Carrs not touched before we are hoping we can do the same again this year. At the moment we are looking at working in the Twinnies Bridge area (which will help the National Trust control the Balsam on their land in Styal Woods) for our second date with Twinnies Bridge car park as the meeting point for the 24th June again at 2pm. I hope we will see you at one or other of the sessions, or better still at both!

To celebrate its 100th show the Alderley Edge and Wilmslow Horticultural Society teamed up with the local rangers and Friends of The Carrs to plant a copper beech tree in The Carrs on the 8th December.

The Committee plan to plant more wild flowers this year to add to the variety of flora on The Carrs. We had mixed success with the selection planted last autumn. The primroses and cowslips succeeded very well and will be added to this year as well as a selection of marsh-loving plants such as marsh marigold, water avens and devils bit scabious.

Purple Loosestrife also succeeded well. This is a tall, handsome plant which produced vivid purple splashes across The Carrs and attracted bees like a magnet.

However the ox-eye daisies and the wood anemones appear to have vanished without trace.

Riverbank Erosion

Work on the prevention of further erosion of the river banks continues. The work on the area near the new bridge seems to have improved the flow of the river under the bridge and will hopefully prevent damage to the bridge supports. The balsam which was attempting to infiltrate the boulders has been removed. The river bank reinforcement project started early last year has been the subject of numerous articles in the press, some illustrated with photos of The Carrs. The Christmas trees, laid along the river banks are a vital part of the project. These have now weathered nicely and vegetation has grown up around them. They have also accumulated plenty of flotsam as planned to build up the banks.
